Learner Engagement This workshop aims to promote authentic connections, foster creativity, and share valuable resources that will enhance the learning experience for LINC learners. Audience will learn how to foster authentic connections to enhance learner engagement, brainstorming creative and interactive classroom activities and sharing valuable resources.

Weaving In Diverse Content - Indigenous Topics in the EAL Classroom

LINC Curriculum

The session will focus on using Indigenous content in our EAL classrooms year-round to increase student awareness of Indigenous Peoples. There will be a brief opportunity to reflect on participants' current practices, and a variety of Indigenous content suggestions will be shared. Participants will receive a QR code for a handout with a list of important recognized dates as well as Indigenous content ideas for ten common LINC themes (ex. employment, health). Participants will see how a suggestion from the handout can be used in a beginner or intermediate class.

Tech in Classroom

Multisensory Engagement, Translanguaging, and Guided Technology: Inclusive Practices for LINC Futures

Teaching Strategies

Mehdi H., New Directions English Language School

This session explores inclusive practices in LINC by combining multisensory engagement, translanguaging, and guided technology. Drawing on neuroscience and TESOL research, it highlights the risks of passive tech use while showing how AI tools and Google Translate can foster reflection and autonomy. Participants will experience activities that validate identities, strengthen community, and build learner confidence. Adaptable across LINC levels 1–8, these strategies enhance engagement, reduce barriers, and maximize learning outcomes.

Early Childhood Education

Bridging Ages: Strategies for Supporting Multi-Age Groups in Childminding Rooms Angelica Naslund, Kamloops Immigrant Services

Diverse Client Groups Explore the opportunities and challenges of working in multi-age childminding rooms. We will learn practical strategies to create safe, inclusive, and engaging environments that support children at different developmental stages. Topics include environment setup, programming, transitions, safety, and social-emotional guidance. With real-life examples and reflection, participants will gain/share tools to approach multi-age settings with confidence, flexibility, and creativity.

Land Acknowledgement and Reflection

Learner Engagement The presentation offers a land acknowledgement through the lens of an immigrant educator, connecting its meaning to LINC classrooms. In Canada, land acknowledgements are central to recognition and reconciliation, and LINC classrooms should reflect these values. Grounded in the First Peoples Principles of Learning, the session models reflective, relational practice and invites participants to consider their own identities. Attendees will explore a layered approach reflecting migration, belonging, and identity, leaving with strategies to integrate acknowledgements into language learning.

Insights for Supporting Low-Level and Literacy Learners in Online Environments

Teaching Online

Kerry Grae Campbell-Clark, Columbia Basin Alliance for Literacy (Remote Presenter) Low-level and literacy students often face significant barriers to participating in online activities. Barriers such as limited digital skills, lack of confidence, inadequate access to technology, and challenges in understanding online content can hinder their participation. Addressing these barriers is critical for fostering inclusion and supporting their learning. This presentation outlines a strategic approach to help these students engage more effectively in virtual learning environments, ensuring that everyone is provided opportunity to succeed and develop language and literacy skills.

Tech in Classroom

Gamifying Digital Learning in LINC: Free Tools for Different Levels

Learner Engagement Gamification can transform learning into play, motivating learners and making lessons more interactive. This session highlights free resources that LINC instructors can use to engage students in the classroom and beyond. Participants will explore Liveworksheets for creating interactive practice, Games to Learn English for fun skill-building, Duolingo for independent study, and JeopardyLabs for collaborative team competition. The presentation includes live demos, practical classroom tips to help instructors apply these tools across CLB levels.

It also hinges upon how well learners apply their digital skills to the digital environment in another language and learning format. Learner Engagement Participants will explore how to create a basic interactive H5P video in Avenue.ca. Through a real-time demonstration and hands-on practice, they will gain confidence in the ease of making interactive content, experiment with the most common question types, and learn practical tips to streamline the process. The session emphasizes keeping it simple and allows participants to reflect on how they could use H5P videos with their own learners. By the end, teachers will leave with skills, strategies, and confidence to begin implements interactive videos immediately in their LINC classrooms.
